Second Tompkins Co. Courthouse	121 E. Court	1854	Known as the Old Courthouse. Red brick with stucco, over a stone foundation, with open-timber roof and belfry.

Rice Hall	Tower Road	1911	Renaissance style, rusticated brick imitating clapboards, w/ coursed brickwork above

Caldwell Hall	Reservoir Road	1914	Renaissance style, designed by Green & Wicks
Bailey Hall	Garden Ave & Reservoir	1912	Greek Revival designed by Edward Green, named after first dean of CALS, seats 1324

Morrill Hall	Arts Quad, west side	1868	Ithaca Bluestone, \$70,111 original cost, Second Empire and Italian Renaissance style
Telluride House	217 West Ave.	1910	Residence Hall of select Cornellians like Linus Pauling. Arts and Crafts style.
Deke House	13 South	1893	Romanesque style, designed by William Henry Miller, frat house, two trees in front planted by Teddy Roosevelt
Llenroc	100 Cornell Ave.	1865	Ezra Cornell's house, Gothic Revival style, Llenroc limestone, now a frat house
